Our New Products

In the fall of 2009, we updated and released *To Save a Life: Ending Domestic Violence in Jewish Families* with new interviews and footage. This DVD program offers excellent introductory information about domestic violence in Jewish families and discusses shalom bayit, Kiddush Ha-Shem, and teshuvah. Through interviews with survivors, rabbis, and counselors, it provides reassurance to Jewish women that the abuse is not their fault, they are not alone, and help is available.

"This DVD covers all the bases. It thoroughly explores all the aspects of family violence amid an illuminating and supportive discussion of Jewish perspectives on the issue," stated Rabbi Elliot Dorff, Rector and Distinguished Professor of Philosophy, American Jewish University.

Women from Jewish & Muslim Communities, one of 18 webinars offered, explored the concept of cultural competency for domestic violence advocates as including awareness and sensitivity to not just the ethnic and cultural diversity, but also to the religious traditions of the women they serve. Presented by Rabbi Mark Dratch and Salma Abugideiri, this live webinar provided best practices for working with Jewish and Muslim women and discussed how faith can be used as a resource of empowerment and healing for survivors.
